Helping CWU to Become a Model of Safety: What Employees Can Do to Lead Gender-Based Violence Prevention and Response Efforts

For six months during the last academic year, the CWU Safe Work Group reviewed best practices related to the prevention and handling of gender-based violence, and then developed recommendations for CWU based on expert presentations, stakeholder consultation, and community feedback. The recommendations, which were approved this summer, include opportunities for all CWU employees to exhibit leadership in preventing harm from occurring in the classroom and workplace, and through trauma-informed training, lead efforts to improve how we respond to those who have experienced harm.
