Our S&A account for grants is solely used to fund students that the OUR grants committee has decided to award. There are no other expenses that come out of that budget. For SOURCE, since the whole event is geared towards students, that budget is broken down into different items and services we will need for the event such as catering, surc rentals, awards, etc.

We had a positive fund balance in each of our S&A accounts at the end of the year. For grants, we had leftover money since our funding requests from grant applications did not exceed the amount we receive from S&A. We are working to reach more students so we will have more grant applications from a more diverse list of disciplines. For SOURCE, this budget had been in the red for many years prior, so as our first year as Program Coordinator and Director, we worked hard to cut the budget extensively to make sure SOURCE would remain a sustainable event for years to come.

We receive state funds for our position salaries and our office budget and are pursuing foundation funds to help with more grant programs and to help pay our alumni keynote speakers for SOURCE.

- Does your program provide employment opportunities for students? Please explain the nature of student employment within your unit, including total FTE and number of students employed. No (Our GA is funded by Graduate Studies)
- 6. How many students utilize the services and activities provided by your program? Describe how statistics are obtained and provide demographics as applicable. This last Fall, 26 students applied for research/travel grants from the OUR. 18 were from COTS, 4 were from CEPS, and 4 were from CAH. These are the grant applications that were funded and the discipline the students were from: 1 psychology, 3 Environmental studies, 1 family and consumer sciences, 3 elementary education, 2 biochemistry, 2 physics, 1 anthropology, 2 molecular and cell biology, 1 math, and 1 actuarial science. SOURCE 2019 had over 600 student presenters from all across campus. We awarded 30 students for excellent presentations, and had 30 student volunteers working at the event.
- 7. How do you asses the effectiveness of the services and activities you provide to students? Is student input collected and used in this process? Yes, we collect feedback before and after SOURCE and before and after grants. We are working to better serve all students, rather than just those in the sciences. We are always looking for suggestions to continue improvement on SOURCE, which is going into its 25th year.
- 8. Does your program have an advisory committee? If so, in what capacity is it involved in your budgeting process? We have a SOURCE committee, that primarily helps plan different aspects of the event, and informs their faculty and students to help increase participation. They are not involved with the budgeting process, but we review the budget with them every year.

- 9. What would be the impact to students if this program's funding were increased by 15-20%? We would not be able to fund as many grant applications as we normally do, possibly preventing students from going into a research project or travelling to present their work at conferences. What would be the impact to students if this program's funding were decreased by 15-20%? We would be able to create more categories of grants, to better serve students across colleges and disciplines, since we are trying not to only fund students from the sciences. We would also be able to increase grant award amounts to provide more aid to students who need the funding.

The mission of SOURCE is to provide a university-wide forum for CWU students representing all disciplines, and experience levels, to present their mentored research, scholarship, and creative works in a juried environment and meeting professional expectations.
