Please provide an overview of the student-centered programming provided, i.e. type of programs, milestones, number of students impacted, and how they benefited.

The purpose of the Gallery is to offer the campus of Central Washington University and the community at large the opportunity to view and experience visual art, that they would not otherwise be able to experience, first-hand. The Gallery also presents viewers with opportunities to explore culturally diverse ideas in an academic environment.

On average, 4,000 visits are made to the CWU Sarah Spurgeon Gallery annually by students, faculty, staff, and community members. The gallery offers five or six exhibits per academic year, as well as opening receptions, lectures, and artist demonstrations. All programs are free and open to the public.

Highlights from the 2022-2023 Academic Year:

Three exhibits by regional artists were presented with a focus on current themes and practices in contemporary art. All exhibits were accompanied by public lectures:

- 1. Twenty-three members of the SOIL Artist Collective exhibited their experimental artwork, everything from painting and plastic sculpture, to video and fiber arts. They also gave a panel discussion on how nonprofit artist collectives and galleries can be beneficial for young and emerging artists.
- 2. Cozette Phillips, a Spokane-based artist and faculty member at Spokane Falls Community College, presented her environmentally conscious exhibit titled OMNIDIRECTIONAL. Phillips uses metal alloys, plastics, and concrete in her sculptures to reflect upon the influence that industry and development have upon nature.

3. Korean-American artist Rob Rhee's exhibit Roote Wordes was a collaboration with the Department of English and Matt Martinson from The Douglas Honors College, who moderated Rhee's artist talk. Rhee's work incorporates poetry, critical writing, sculpture, and performance.

The gallery featured the annual Juried Undergraduate Student Art + Design Exhibit, providing students with the practical experience of displaying their artwork, and building their artist resumes. The exhibit included work by 76 students, and gave them \$4950 in awards (a large increase from \$3500 in 2022). This included five purchase awards: three SURC purchase awards and two Ted and Louise Wiprud purchase awards (these artworks are now part of the university's permanent art collection).

The biennial Department of Art + Design Faculty Exhibit gave students and the community the opportunity to see recent artwork by twenty-one current and retired art professors, and graduating teaching assistants.
