History Faculty Win Major CWU Awards

Central Washington University presented Professors Jason Knirck and Josué Quezada Estrada with prestigious awards this spring, once more highlighting the excellence of the History Department.

Dr. Jason Knirck, Professor and Chair of the History

Department received the Board of Trustees Distinguished Faculty Ave



ulty Award. He collected a \$5,000 prize and a release from teaching for one quarter for the 2022/23 academic year. Dr. Knirck has been with CWU for 17 years and previously won other awards from the Board of Trustees. A University Press release states that Dr. Knirck, "demonstrated a balance of excellence in teaching, scholarship, and service that befit this honor. He has taught 24 classes in the Department of History at all levels since 2005, covering a broad range of subjects. He

also has mentored numerous students in graduate and undergraduate projects and theses while creating a variety of courses to enhance the department's curricular offerings. Along the way, Prof. Knirck has become one of the most popular teachers in the department for his expertise, enthusiasm, rigor, ability to connect with students, his methodologies, and his sense of humor."

Dr. Josué Quezada Estrada, Assistant Professor of History, received the President's Diver-



sity award along with ten other CWU employees and one campus organization. The award recogniz-

es faculty who have exterted extraordinary effort to make the University a more diverse, equitable, and inclusive institution, both for those on campus and for members of the community. CWU President James Wohlpart co-hosted

Dr. Estrada published a review of Race and Partisanship in California Redistricting: From the 1965 Voting Rights Act to Present, by Oliver Richomne in the Journal of American Ethnic History.



Kaelen Sauriol won two awards for her thesis "Russian Women Emigres after the Revolution" written under the supervision of Dr. Roxanne Easley. Sauriol received the Dale and Mary Jo Comstock Distinguished Award for the best Masters thesis at CWU (shared with Jessica Coffey of Cultural and Environmental Resource Management). She also received the Topmiller Award for the best History Department MA thesis. The Topmiller Award honors the memory of Robert Topmiller, a CWU grad and a former professor and scholar of the Vietnam War at Eastern Kentucky University.

CWU History Department MA students are consistent winners of the prize.

Lily Alcazar Oseguera successfully presented her thesis proposal about braceros (Mexican contract workers) in Yakima Valley during World War II. This project seeks to deepen our understanding on the Bracero Program in Washington State.

Ulysis Cruz Antonio is studying the movement of people from Oaxaca, Mexico to Washington State, and their creation of transnational communities. This thesis will be a significan contribution to Washington's Chicano/a/x History.
