Course Name: ADMG 285 Sustainable Decision Making

Credits: 5 | Prerequisites: NONE

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Examines the impact of decision-making using short/long term outlook and multiple perspectives. Develops skills to critically evaluate economic, environmental and social impacts of decisions as well as appropriate methods to professionally communicate those decisions.
