Course Name: IT 111 Your Digital Footprint and the Web

Credits: 4 | Prerequisites: NONE

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Examines impact of online activities on personal, academic, and professional lives, plus the global impact of technology and our interactions with that technology. Develops skills to maintain and leverage digital footprints, critically evaluate online content, and cultivate e-professionalism.
