## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

*In its custody of books. . . , the library has confronted and tamed technology, the forces of change, and the power of princes time and again.*

Matthew Battles, *Library: An Unquiet History*, 2003.

While Matthew Battles was employed to choose which items to send to Harvard's book depository, he got "lost in the stacks" of Widener Library. Threading through the maze of shelves and call numbers, we accompany him into the dark and light passages of the world of books and libraries.

In the lighter passages, Battles reminds us that the library is a place where several worlds come together, as this year's slogan for Library Week, "Come Together @ your library," suggests. The author and literary critic Alfred Kazin, who educated himself at the New York Public Library, described it as a forum of "doers and dreamers," as a place to meet people through their writings, as an exploration of the distant places described in books, as a citadel of freedom, where readers could choose any materials they liked, "no questions asked."

Mary Antin, immigration rights activist, viewed coming together at the library more literally. The children, the scholars, the leisured lady readers, and the tourists who visited the Boston Public Library shared a "noble treasure house of learning." Evoking the experience of assimilation into American culture, Antin found it "wonderful" to say that the library was hers. But "it was thrilling to say, this [library] is ours."

Coming together with the times, places, and people in Battle's book is a rich encounter. They will make you laugh; they will make you cry; they will inspire you to prize the library in an unquiet way.
