CWU ALCOHOL & DRUG POLICY THE BASICS

- Alcohol possession and consumption are expressly forbidden on campus property, except by persons of age in the privacy of specifically designated areas, residence hall rooms and apartments.
- Furnishing alcohol to minors in any form is prohibited.
- Smoking of any substance inside any campus building is not allowed.
- Possession, consumption, intoxication or trade of any federally scheduled* substance on campus or at any University sponsored event is prohibited.

*Federal Schedules

Schedule 1—heroin and many other opiates, PCP, LSD, GHB, DMT, Ecstasy, Peyote, Psilocybin Mushrooms & Cannabis

Schedule 2—Morphine & Methadone, Cocaine, Ritalin, Amphetamines

Schedule 3—Ketamine, LSA, Anabolic Steroids

Schedule 4— Many Barbiturates, Xanax & Valium



CREATIVE LEARNING HEALTHFUL LIVING

The abuse of drugs, including alcohol, has a detrimental effect on student life and academic success. At Central Washington University, we are committed to providing an atmosphere of creative learning and healthful living for students and have implemented policies that prohibit the illegal use of alcohol and other drugs, on campus or off!

University Sanctions—Students will need to meet with university personnel to discuss any violation of school policy and sanctions could include taking an alcohol education class, parental notification, a formal AOD assessment or suspension from school. Student Sanctions



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Prime For Life is an 8-hour class that is offered four times a quarter to students who have been sanctioned by the courts, Student Affairs, or the Office of Housing as a consequence of violating state laws or the student code of conduct. In addition to the class, students complete an online alcohol and drug assessment and a one-on-one interview with the facilitator of the class. Except for DUI related offenses, Prime For Life is a court-approved alternative to the **ALCOHOL & DRUG INFORMATION SCHOOL (ADIS)** offered in the community. If a student has been court ordered to receive an alcohol and drug evaluation, they need to have

this completed by a state certified agency in the community.

Under The Influence and **Marijuana 101** are both web-based classes that take approximately 1.5 – 2 hours to complete. Typically a student will be asked to take **Under The Influence** for a minor alcohol offense that violates the student code of conduct or the housing policy. **Marijuana 101** is typically assigned to students who violate state law or university policy with respect to marijuana. The courts often accept it as an alternative to the ADIS, but students need to confirm this with their probation contacts.

did you know

Giving alcohol to anyone under 21 = \$1,000 fine and/or 90 days in jail

Trying to purchase alcohol if you are under 21 = up to \$1,000 fine and 90 days in jail

If you are too loud, such as shouting, music, car stereo, after 10 p.m. = \$250 - \$1000 fine



Urinating in public and fighting in public = max \$1,000 fine and/or 90 days in jail

Providing an ID to a minor = Min \$2,500 fine and up to 1 year of jail

Open alcohol container in the car or in public = \$250 fine

Minor in Possession – Maximum \$5000 fine and 1 year in jail

DUI for alcohol = mandatory minimum 1 day in jail, AOD Evaluation/Treatment and probation for up to 5 years and a \$5000 fine

health effects

Alcohol consumption causes a number of marked changes in behavior. Even low doses significantly impair the judgment and coordination required to drive a car safely. Low to moderate doses of alcohol also increase the incidence of a variety of aggressive acts. Moderate to high doses of alcohol cause marked impairments in higher mental functions, severely altering a person's ability to learn and remember information. Very high doses cause respiratory depression and death. If combined with other depressants of the central nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just described. Repeated use of alcohol can lead to dependence. For more information on these and other alcohol health risks please follow this link.
