All S&A funding is used to pay for professional staff salaries and a portion of the SURC bond payment. S&A funds do not cover any other expenses.

All S&A funding is fully utilized to cover salaries and the bond payment. Any fund balance is the result of the recreation fee paid by students and self-generated revenue.

The Recreation fee covers the majority of our budget and has recently been increased due to minimum wage increases and staff raises. An additional source of funds comes from self-generated revenue (memberships, programs and services)

The SURC bond payment is tied to this funding request.

Does your program provide employment opportunities for students? Please explain the nature of student employment within your unit, including total FTE and number of students employed.

University Recreation hires over 150 students every quarter in over 25 positions. Our facility is open close to 5,000 hours annually. We are the second largest employer of students on campus and these student employees are developed by the professional staff in Recreation, some of which are covered by this S&A funding.

6. How many students utilize the services and activities provided by your program? Describe how statistics are obtained and provide demographics as applicable.

During 2018-2019, the Recreation Center and RSC had 269,742 visits. CWU Academic Assessment and Research reviewed our access data and determined that 75% of students in all demographics use our facility.

7. How do you asses the effectiveness of the services and activities you provide to students? Is student input collected and used in this process?

Student employees are engaged in a brainstorming session every January to determine where the Recreation Department can improve. This session provides insight into student needs and wants annually. In addition, comment cards are available in the facility for feedback.

The Recreation Advisory Board reviews our budget annually.

9. What would be the impact to students if this program's funding were increased by 15-20%?

An increase in funding would result in more funds being available for student employment or capital equipment purchases.

A decrease in funding would defer capital improvement purchases and may possibly lead to reduced student employment opportunities.
