Initiative 3.3: Support and expand access to basic needs, including establishing a resource coordinator dedicated to assisting students experiencing food and housing insecurity.



Question 1:

What are some basic needs concerns that you see students face in your role? (Please provide three strategies)

Basic Needs Statistics

- WSAC Statewide Postsecondary Basic Needs Survey - 2023
 - South Kittitas reported the highest rate of basic needs insecurity at 57.9%.
 - 35% of CWU students reported as facing housing insecurity.
 - 78% of students in the South-Central Region reported the inability to afford childcare.
- Student Financial Wellness Survey - Fall 2023.
 - 65% of students worry about having enough money to pay for school.
 - 44% of students reported being housing insecure.





“...Basic needs insecurity is a structural issue, not an individual characteristic or shortcoming. People face basic needs insecurity when the “ecosystem” of support is not in place, not because of a personal decision or action.” (Henry & Beecher, 2021).

Reducing Stigma

Creating a culture of caring depends on the whole community, including you.

- Never assume someone's basic needs security based on appearance or actions.
- Be open about resources on campus and if you've used them.
- Introduce students to resources yourself if you can.

- Align University infrastructure to support long term basic needs programs and initiatives.
- Expand online resource support for students.

Resource Coordinator

- Funded through HB1559
- Serves as the single point of contact for students seeking basic needs assistance
- Oversees:
 - WSAC SSEH Grant Opportunity
 - Hunger-Free Basic Needs Strategic Plan
 - Connects students with resources
 - Assists in applications for state benefits
 - WIC
 - SNAP



How has the position shifted?

Resource Navigator

Under Case Management

Part-time Graduate student at 10 hours

Focused primarily on WSAC SSEH

Basic Needs Resource Coordinator

Under the Presidents Office

Full Time at 40 Hours

Focused on Basic Needs Initiatives outside of the grant



WSAC SSEH Grant

\$102,000 annual grant issued to support students experiencing homelessness

- Funds a Part-time Student Position
- Budgeted \$91,500 towards basic needs assistance – Indefinite funding
- Cost of Attendance is no longer a barrier
- Students are eligible if they:
 - Aged out of foster care
 - Homeless
 - Housing Insecure
 - Non-tradition, graduate, and international students are eligible as well

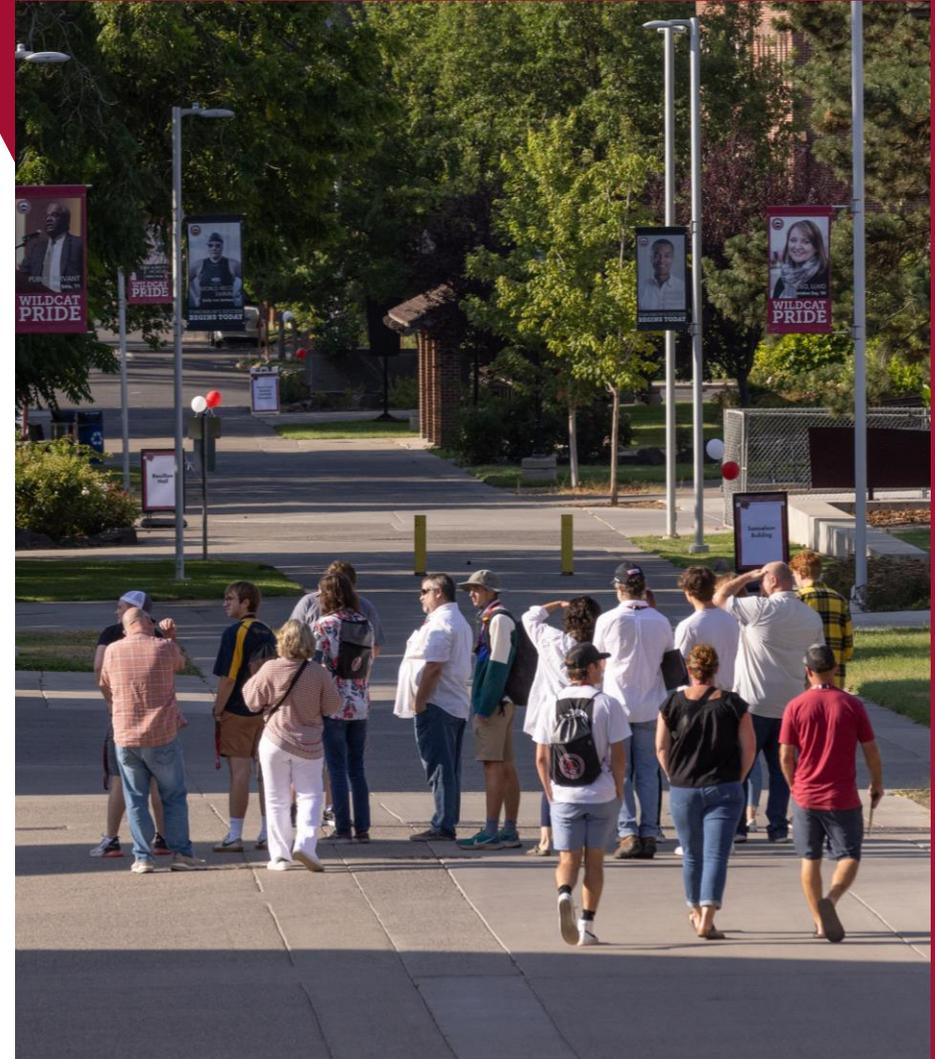




**Question 3:

WSAC SSEH Grant

- Distributed over \$86,000 worth of aid in 2024
- Awarded to 40 students
- Award amounts range from \$300 - \$4,000
- Increase of interest from the following student populations:
 - International Students
 - Students with families
 - Attend in CWU Centers

Served 5,000+ individuals

Distributed 50,000lb+



Basic Needs

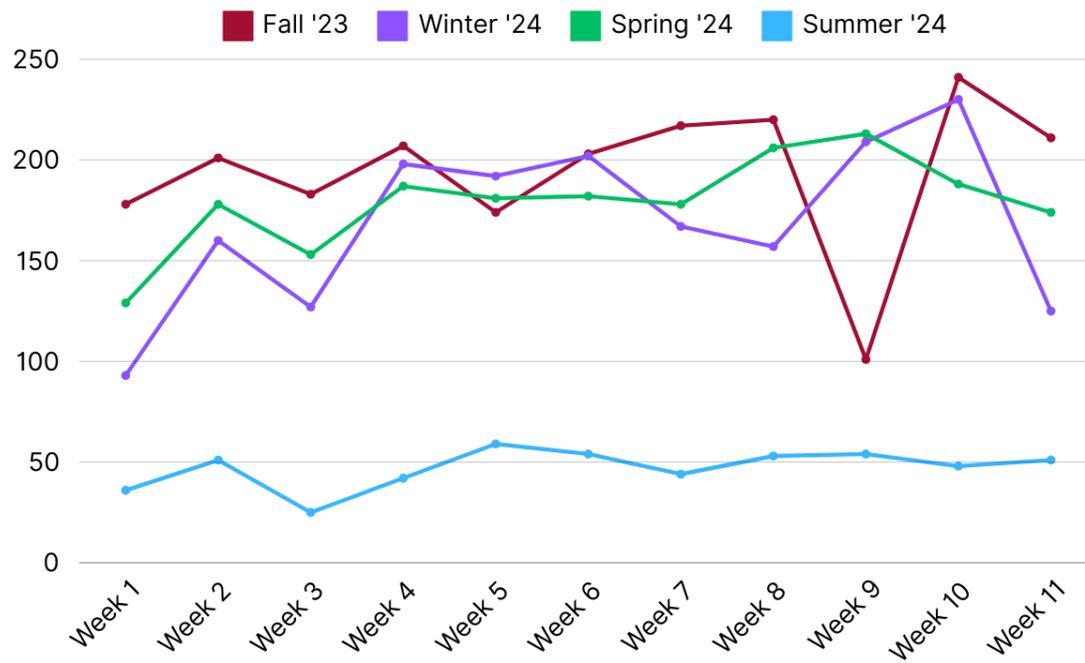
- 47% of CWU students are food insecure (WSAC, 2023)
- That is a total of 3,700 students in a single academic year
- 3000+ Wildcat Pantry visits in AY 2022-23, 22% recurring
 - 100% said pantry improved their CWU experience
 - Save money for other living/college costs 70%
 - Improved Mental health 56%
 - More time to focus on academics 49%

Visits to the Pantry

Wildcat Pantry Weekly Visits 2023-2024 Academic Year



Weekly Average: 138 visitors per week

Monthly Average: 442 visitors per month

2022 – 2023 Visits: 3010

2023 – 2024 Visits: 6628

Growth Rate: 120%

Projected growth rate for 2024 – 2025: 36%

Estimated visits for 2024 – 2025: 9000+

Local Partnerships

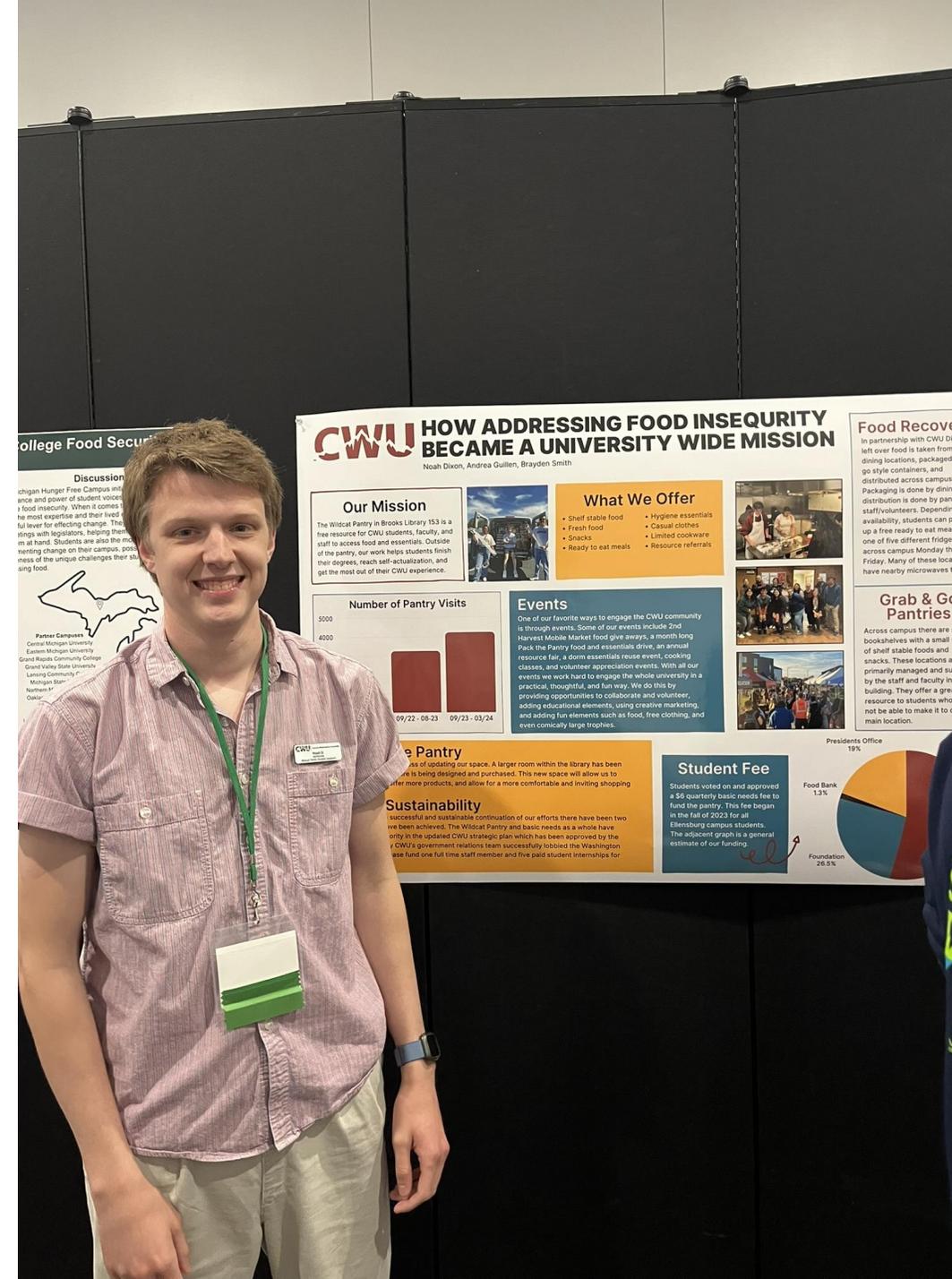
- FISH

- Emergency Meal Card Program (Winter '25)

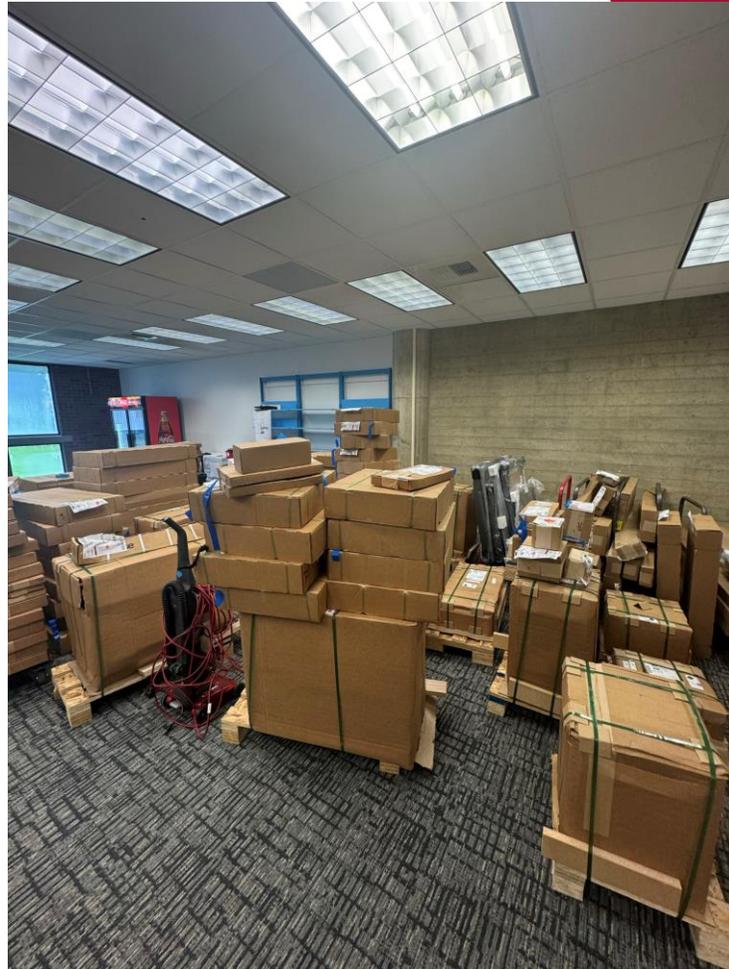
