## Public Service and Government

Students interested in a career in public service through government or the non-profit sector will find that this track offers a choice of classes that promote balanced learning between the formal structure of government and the more flexible nature of non-profit advocacy. This major allows students to examine the inner-workings of government, including the legislative process, the development of public policy, provisions of public health services, etc..., as well as an opportunity to explore roles and careers in the public service sector and gain a better understanding of the roles advocates play in the support of marginalized communities and populations. This major is supported by courses in Anthropology, History, IDS, Law & Justice, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology.

### Program Objectives

Students will explore the role of government in daily life, including legislation, public policy, public health, law enforcement, and the court system.

Students will identify roles and careers within the public service sector.

Students will explore the impact of social systems on social justice and marginalized communities.

Students will recognize the three branches of federal government and understand how each branch impacts states, communities and individuals.
