



On 22-24 April 2022 the CWU Wildcat Battalion partnered with Gonzaga University and EWU to form Task Force Washington for a Field Training Exercise (FTX) at Camp Seven Mile Military Reservation in Spokane, WA.

The FTX allowed cadets to gain practice integrating and leading with cadets from other programs. MS1's-MS3 conducted day and night land navigation training on Friday and then were divided between three platoons that conducted tactical patrolling missions over the following 36 hours.

MS4 cadets gained experience in planning and executing training exercises during the lead up to the event and during execution through the various roles they filled. CWU cadets came away from the training feeling they gained valuable experience through the three days of training. MS3's in particular were able to identify areas to focus on before the final FTX of the year being held this upcoming weekend and before reporting to Cadet Summer Training in the following months.

mile foot march on the





To earn the Wildcat Battalion RECONDO tab, cadets must complete various physical tasks. This year, the tasks included earning a 540 on the ACFT,






# **Toilet Bowl**
