What can you do with a Ph.D. in Theatre Arts?

The value and purpose of a graduate degree in theatre arts can vary depending on the student's professional and personal goals.

Those who wish to teach at the college **or university level** need either an M.F.A. or a Ph.D. The relationship between the degree and the teaching position can vary from institution to institution, but in general, the M.F.A. is appropriate for those teaching in artistic or production areas (acting, directing, playwriting, design, technical production), while the Ph.D. is appropriate for those teaching in theatre studies (theatre history, dramatic literature, theory, criticism). However, many Ph.D. faculty teach acting, directing, playwriting or design, and some M.F.A. faculty teach history and literature.
