A Doctor of Musical Arts degree (DMA) is the highest possible academic degree for musicians, and is intended for those who want to pursue a doctoral-level academic study in music, as well as specialize in the theory and practicum of their instrument of choice. The Music Education Degree (DME) is especially for students who wish to teach appreciation of music and technical theory to college

students.
