Veteran Memorial to Break Ground This Year

Progress on the proposed veteran’s memorial at Central Washington University is well underway, and has made substantial strides since the Veterans Memorial Task Force was founded in January. The task force has decided on a concept which is being designed by Gregg Schlanger (photo below). The design will consist of several large basalt pillars which will display stories that veterans have written about their experiences with war. The stories that are on the memorial will serve as a way to stir a reaction in any viewer, regardless of military service or affiliation. We believe that this is what makes a successful memorial, and one which means something to whoever passes by.



The next big steps are presenting the concept to the Enterprise Facilities Committee for final approval, coming to a consensus on whether or not to include veteran names, and to secure funding. The ASCWU Student Government will be providing some funding for the memorial, however alumni support will be critical in order to make this project a success.
