Meeting was called to order at 3:10 p.m.

## Review Log

### Course changes

ENTP 287 Applied Product Development – Concern with personality tests used as assessment. (Jason)  
The last change was made in 2020. This is okay.

ENTP 300 Principles of Entrepreneurship. Outcomes were changed in 2019. This is okay.

HED 310 – Outcomes are utilize describe, identify, and explain. No approval date of last outcomes, so they are more than five years. (Sayantani)

IT 482 Cybersecurity Capstone – Updated in 2018. Oddly formatted outcomes. Assessments are the same for all the learning outcomes. Display in the catalog will be “Students will be able to”: then bulleted outcomes. This is okay.

TH 242 Stage Dance – Low level outcomes for the course and utilize a lot of the word “demonstrate” in the outcomes.

TH 482 – The outcomes and assessments look like they are flipped. Sayantani

Course change proposals were approved for campus review.

New Course – Approved to move out for campus review.

## Program changes

#4 English MA – Utilize the word “demonstrate” in a number of program outcomes. Is this too specific for program level outcomes? Hongtao indicated that the outcomes need improvement. Mike G indicated there is a comment from Graduate Council about the language in the outcomes. They moved it forward so the Curriculum committee could review them.

#12 IT Leadership Graduate Certificate – All of the courses have been deleted. The student will select the courses to be approved by the department. The outcomes are low for a masters certificate. The committee decided to request additional information about the proposal from the department as well as the outcomes. (Jeff) Mike G. I believe these changes violate CWUR 2-50-090, as it eliminates the "...prescribed set of regular credit-bearing courses..." but feel that the determination to allow or disallow this must come from either the Grad Council or FSCC.

Hongtao indicated that the Graduate Council is talking about wanting graduate faculty on the curriculum committee. They will only be reviewing programs and not courses.

#9 History, MA – Potentially a typo on the learner outcomes #3 produce an scholarly analysis should be an “a” scholarly analysis. Will make the clerical change.

Program changes were approved to move for campus review.

## Program deletion or Reserve

#5 English MA TESOL Specialization

Program deletion/reserve were approved for campus review.

Jeff indicated we should send a notice to department chairs regarding course outcomes. If they haven't made changes to outcomes in the last five years, they will be open to scrutiny. This is something that should be put in procedures or policy.

Program and course learner outcomes – Would like to update the taxonomy information that is currently on the website. This needs to move quickly so this can go out to faculty. Kurt volunteered to help.

X98 courses flexibility – Would like to see more flexibility in the 398 and 498 courses to help departments with visiting faculty as well as additional flexibility for departments to offer special topics. Mike G indicated that they can make these courses so they don't have to meet the deadlines, but faculty need to be aware if they are teaching in-person there may be limited classroom space available. Policy and procedure may need to be modified to be able to accommodate more flexibility. The committee will continue working on this issue and discuss at the next meeting.

Jason asked how many of these type of courses that normally come in. Mike G indicated he will try and get information for the past five years.
