Course Requirements and Policies

Course Description:

This online course will provide Students with opportunities to increase student's awareness and knowledge in a way that is personally meaningful to students. In the process of learning, students will be expected to read, write, communicate, and access information technology.

Course Objectives:

In the United States, why do we still have the poor? Are the problems in our society the fault of individuals? Do social problems differ from personal issues? How do we understand issues such as poverty, homelessness, racism, sexism, homophobia, crime in our society? Is it possible to solve these issues? What is the role of public policy in addressing social problems?

These are some of the questions that we will explore in our study of social problems. Although these are important questions, there is NO one answer to them. Politicians, scholars and members of our society disagree as to the nature of social problems and their solutions. This course is to encourage you to think critically about social problems and develop the skills and knowledge necessary to evaluate the

relationship between individual and social issues. We will apply the skills and knowledge developed in this class towards addressing social problems in our community.

Goals:

1. Introduce sociological perspectives and methodology
2. Increase understanding of social problems and the theoretical frameworks that sociologists use to explain social problems
3. Develop critical thinking and writing skills
4. Encourage students consider the merits of arguments that differ from your own preferences
5. Develop ability to articulate views about social problems based on evidence and information, and a willingness to learn from and understand the views of others.
6. Learn about and work toward solving social problems through learning activities

Readings
