A maximum of 5 credits of 100-level electives and up to 5 credits of 200-level electives may be counted toward the major. PSY 363, Intermediate Statistics and Research Methods is an approved elective. Students seeking a BA degree must complete one year college/university study or two years high school study of a single world language.
