Communications

Dr. Smith

Professor in department of music, associate provost with program accreditation and issues, focusing on priority issues over the course of the next few years. How canvas works and operates, using information on student performance. Asking to what degree do students comprehend how assessments are used to improve programs?

Economics: Is this in relation to SEOI's?

Dr. Smith: This is something similar to SEOI's, researching how programs overall are meeting what they are setting out to do. Every program has a list of intended outcomes of programs, and needs to figure out

how to get evidence on how these are being met. Trying to communicate the importance of these assessments to students, asking Senators how aware they are of these assessments throughout their program and curriculum. Canvas and the use of speed grader are ways to provide quick feedback to students. Any suggestions from students to adjust evaluation assessments, and curriculum feedback is encouraged through the use of the 'nine questions a savvy student should ask.'

Consumer Sciences: A committee through SAS will also be surveying students about similar topics if you would like to collaborate and include some of these topics in our survey.

Funds Requests

Chemistry—\$1500

Attending the American Chemical Society's national meeting and exposition will allow students to gain practice presenting their research in a professional manner, was well as allow for a broad range of feedback from other conference attendees that could help to improve their research going forward. ACS national meetings have a great number of presentations and poster sessions across all disciplines of chemistry that will give students an opportunity to expand their knowledge about current topics. The meeting also hosts a career fair that students are eligible to participate in, allowing greater exposure to the job market. It will be an important step in the professional development of all attendees.

The Child Life Council is the professional organization for child life specialists, who work in pediatric medical environments to help children and their families cope with hospitalization. The Council holds an annual conference where child life and other pediatric medical professionals from around the world present on innovations in the field. Attending the Child Life council annual conference in Orlando, Florida will provide opportunities for CWU child life students to network with professionals in the field,

learn about the newest innovations in child life practice, and share this knowledge with students who are unable to attend.

In order to become certified child life specialists, students need to complete the degree program at CWU and then complete a child life internship. Internships are competitive, so it is very important to network, both for the students who attend the conference, but also to bring awareness of the new CWU child life program to the child life professional community. The conference attracts practicing child life specialists from around the world, so students who attend will have the opportunity to network with potential internships supervisors and future employers as well as learn about the many places and settings in which child life specialist's work. This will benefit students who don't attend the conference as attendees will bring back their new knowledge to the child life club and practicum class. Also, the attendees' presence at the conference will increase the awareness of CWU's program which will help all CWU students when applying for internships. Students who attend the conference will hear from international speakers presenting on the latest innovations in pediatric medicine and child life. This will benefit them as they pursue careers as child life specialists. They will also share this new knowledge in their child life classes and with the child life club, which will enhance the learning of all CWU child life students.
